SECRETS OF THE ATOMIC AND HYDROGEN BOMBS, produced by the Atomic Energy Commission with Herb Philbrick as technical advisor.

Even though this film is a re-run of stuff that everyone and his dog knows (and has thus been classified top secret) most people will get a bang out of it. In fact, two viewers, Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, saw it in 1951 and got quite a charge from it. Nikita "Pudge" Krushchev saw it and liked it so much that he started a do-it-yourself project based on it.

THE GREAT AMERICAN NOVEL, by Paul Danish. Retive Pytym, Denver, 1959. Too many pages. \$1,234,567,890.00 or so. *****ETC.

In his latest novel, Mr. Danish has tried to say a great deal and consequently ended up tongue-tied. The plot has a fantastic quantity of everything; juicy battle scenes, touching love scenes, (the author was touched when he wrote 'em), and delightful stream-of-consciousness passages (since banned in the United States) which were written just after the author removed his hand from the electric fan he stuck it in!

The whole thing is a character study of a street cleaner in Alaska who can't stand the cold and who wants to go to Hawaii. So he saves his money for twenty years and buys steamship tickets and then finds out he's scared of water so he goes to the nearest bar and gets plastered.

The moral: Things can get pretty lush in places other than the tropics, even if you can't get in the swim.

Even while I turn a cold shoulder to most of Mr. Danish's ideas, I still have to give this one top billing. Maybe I should soak my head.

SEARS, ROEBUCK CATALOG, by Sears and Roebuck. Fidel Castro Press, Orete. 1959. 1412 pp. \$0.25?

Because of its beautiful cover, this book is bound to please. The low quality paper, however, looks like it's been beaten to a pulp.

Still, it's absolutely essential for any fine editions and scrap paper collectors.

Content wise, one finds the usual high standards which come from rewriting, right up to publication date. This includes an especially good page 44 which has, unfortunately in view of its content, a lousy printing job. As a matter of fact, I couldn't read it until I got all that black ink which some nasty little man called U.S. Gov. Censor spilled all over it off.

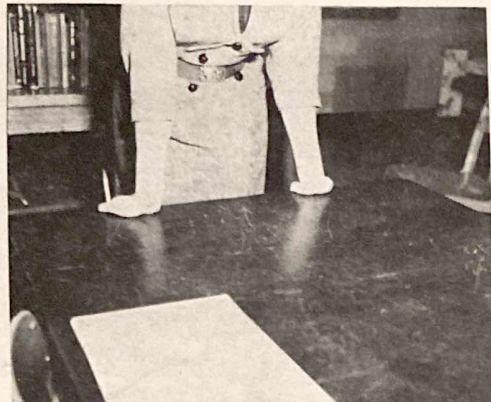

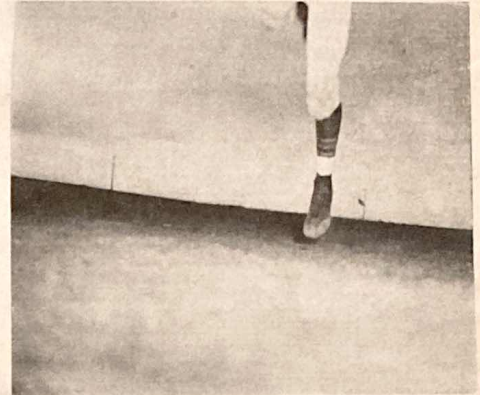

Roy Watts is shown here in a typical track action

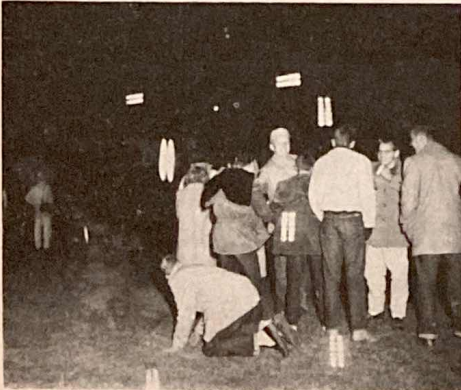
